

Display item – Snooker Championships

Extras

Aim: To display a Snooker Championships using boys as the balls and eventually all the balls being 'potted'

Approx 30 boys



Outfits for 30 boys, 2 cues, 16x35ft green tarpauling, scoreboard, white hoops, table and chairs for players



Approx 15 minutes but will take a long time for arranging and practicing a substantial time taken out of the programme

Level: All - mainly older

Equipment

- Two boys dressed as players (White shirt, bow tie and black trousers) and provided with a cue
- The remaining boys will be dressed in grey/black shorts and t-shirts/vests etc. appropriate
 to the colour of the ball they represent
 - 1 white ball (cue ball)
 - 1 yellow
 - 1 green
 - 1 brown
 - 1 blue
 - 1 pink
 - 1 black
 - 15 reds

The Table and Setting

Large green plastic tarpaulin approximately 16 feet wide by 35 feet long, suitably marked with white tape. Hoops were placed at each of the corners and sides to represent the 'pockets.' The boy's obviously in place on the 'table' as balls. To make the atmosphere authentic, 2 tables were provided for the players with chairs, and the jugs of water and glasses.

Scoreboard

This is made from card to show the state of play to the audience. It represents a proper scoreboard with a 'slide' marker to move on to the appropriate score and the figures on the card are displayed 0-19 and 10, 20, 30 etc.

The Game

In turns each player goes to the edge of the 'table', takes a cueing stance and just touches the white 'ball' with the tip of the cue. The white ball then walks in the direction of the red 'balls' and gently moves against them causing them to scatter. The next player takes his turn.

The Rules that may have to be explained in detail to the boys are:

- After any shot the white ball always completes his movement by stopping reasonably close to the edge of the 'table' to avoid the problem of long cues and rests.
- 2. When playing a red ball, the first red touched by the white always goes into the closest pocket.
- 3. The player then chooses a colour and the colour also goes to the nearest pocket unless indicated by the referee.
- 4. Each player's turn always stops by failure to pot a coloured ball. This is done to avoid having a long series of set moves for the boys to remember.



Make sure players collide gently to avoid any injury from occurring



The Referee

The referee is also suitably dressed in evening and he indicates by either a nod or a shake of the head if the coloured ball is to go in a pocket or not. The game is thus carried out as a normal game of snooker with the referee controlling the totals of each player's score, by indications to the coloured balls as to whether they should g on or stay out of the pocket. For effect the coloured balls are replaced on their spots by the referee lifting them at the elbows and carrying them bodily back. Also, at least once one of the players should ask for the cue ball to be cleaned and the referee carries the cue ball 'off the table' and pretends to clean it with the whiter gloves. If done with anchor boys no actual 'snookers' are used but if older lads are used this and possibly other sophistications could also be attempted.

Note: It will take a lot of work and a substantial amount of boys to pull off a thing like this

This may seem rather complicated, but not only is it a superb display item but once done, can be used as an activity in your Anchor Boy programme for fun.

Various but at little cost



Level:

Aims

- To show parents what the boys have achieved throughout their year in BB
- To help boys to show what they have learned in BB
- · To demonstrate understanding of what they have learned
- To have fun at all times

Equipment

Depending on what mime or drama piece you are doing but improvisation at little cost whether possible

Time

Short and snappy rather than long and dreary

Introduction

- When introducing drama to very young children it is most important that the right foundations should be laid so that the whole thing is show to them as a game.
- Remember that we are not trying to make performers out of the children but to merely stimulate their thought so that they can discover and find out things for themselves.
- You will have to be very patient in the beginning as children of this age learn by repetition and the more they do it the more confident they will get.
- They may well suggest things themselves and you should always be receptive to these suggestions, perhaps turning them around so that all can enjoy them.
- It is much better for you to also get involved, do not just stand and watch, you do not
 want them to perform for you but with you. If you join in you will all share the experience,
 which is what it is all about.

Aims of the drama

There are many purposes behind mime and drama games and the ideal result is a complete experience, which involves mental, physical; and emotional expression. Listed below some of the aims which we consider important:

Self-expression: The child's own contribution to what is happening. We provide the means for doing this and some children have more experience and knowledge than they can ever express in words. Mime is an ideal way of giving way to that experience. It all comes out in 'what' they do.

Co-operation: It is a wonderful moment when a very 'isolated' or 'selfish child' is mature enough to be 'caught' or to come 'second' in the interests of the game. They are probably more surprised than you when this happens.

Stimulus of imagination: Children have always had marvellous imaginations and often-just need to be given an idea for them to enter the world of heroes, villains, make believe etc.



Awareness and sensitivity: Oh, for a quiet session with the Anchor Boys – mime and drama will give you just that. It is the beginning of group control, when to be quiet, when to be still or to move. Thinking and feeling in lots of detail, characters and situations.

Resourcefulness: By solving problems in make -believe situations, the shyest children will gain confidence for solving problems in life. Try it, believe us it works.

A Childs word through a window: I will remember my children watching children's V and looking through round, square or oblong shaped windows to find what they were supposed to be looking for.

You can capture a child's interest by working in the first instance with the things they know and love, e.g., houses, animals, toys, flowers, gardens, trees, trains, planes, holiday, beaches etc.

To keep their interest the game needs to be exciting and fast moving and they will always respond to challenges. DO NOT UNDER ESTIMATE THEM. They respond well to being caught, escaping, losing and finding something. Children do not always accept death as final in Mime. They always have immediate re-incarnation. The villain is always more popular than the hero. Sometimes in younger boys, a girl is popular to play , particularly if they are given the opportunity to really 'ACT' as they call it.
