# **Elephant Catch**



No maximum number depending on adequate supervision



**Aim:** To give the boys something that they can take home to remind them of the African evening

### **Equipment:**

- Template
- Card
- Pencils
- · Felt tip pens, colouring pencils
- Scissors
- String thin string or thread, approx 25cm per elephant
- Hole punch

### Instructions:

- · Photocopy the template onto card, thicker card works best.
- · Cut out the Elephant figure and also the hoop, leaders might need to help with the hoop.
- · Colour in the elephant and hoop using felt tip pens and pencils.
- · Using a hole punch make a hole just under the eye of the elephant and in the ring.
- · Through this put the string, on the other end of the string attach the hoop.
- On completion hold the elephant in your hand and try to flick up the hoop onto the trunk.

# **Bucket Relay**

Aim: To help boys to understand how lucky they are to have access to clean running water, and to see the trouble that some people have to go to, to obtain clean water

# **Equipment:**

- Beanbags
- Buckets

### **Preparation:**

Prior to the game talk to the boys about the problems with dirty water and that many children of their age and younger in Africa have to walk a great distance every day just to get clean running water. Explain that the game they play is a little bit of fun but it has more meaning.

# **Instructions:**

- · Divide boys into teams.
- Place beanbags evenly in a straight line in front of each member of the team.
- · The bucket should be placed next to the first boy.
- On the starting signal the first boy picks up the bucket, puts it on his head and runs to
  the first beanbag, puts it into the bucket and runs back to his team. He hands the bucket
  to the next boy and he does the same.
- The game is repeated until all boys have had a turn and thus all beanbags are in the bucket.
- When this has happened the person who went first now takes back one of the beanbags and places it back where it came from. The game now repeats itself in reverse with all of the beanbags getting put out.
- The winner is the team who sits down with all of their beanbags in front of them.



When doing active sessions like this it is essential that the area in which the boys play is clear of tripping hazards or other dangerous hazards



# **The Snake**

# **Aim:** To give boys a taste of the sort of games that children in Africa might play

This is a game that is commonly played in African countries among young children. It should help the boys to see that although they are more privileged compared to children in Africa they still have things in common. This is something you may wish to discuss with the boys before or after playing the game.

### Instructions:

- · One player is chosen to be the head of the snake.
- This 'snake head' tries to catch another player, and once they do, that other player becomes the 'snake tail' and they hold hands.
- The 'snake head' and 'snake tail' chase the other players, and tagging them from either end, thus making a new head or a new tail as another player is caught.
- · The game continues until all the players are part of 'the snake'.
- Once a snake is becoming large the leader may wish to 'break off' a boy to become a new snake.



Ensure when playing active games such as this that there is a clear area in which the game takes place

# **Pen Top Snake**



No maximum number depending on adequate supervision



# **Equipment:**

- 1" pom-poms
- · Chenille stems
- · Foam sheets
- Pencils
- · Double-sided sticky tape
- · Goggle eyes (available from craft shops)
- · Scissors (preferably decorative edged)
- Stapler
- Glue

The equipment for this activity should be available from a hobby/craft shop.

### Instructions:

- · The equipment for this activity should be available from your nearest hobby/craft store.
- · Cut snake's head and tongue out of the foam.
- · Plait or twist chenille stems together. You'll need 3 per boy.
- Place two strips of sticky sided tape across the head and make a hole as shown (in the middle). This is best done using a sharp pencil and performed by a leader.
- Pass the chenille stems through the hole to secure them in place. They need to be secured on the same side as the sticky tape.
- Remove the backing off the sticky tape and place 2 pom-poms on either side of the chenille stems. Fold over the foam head (in half) and secure the tongue in place with a little sticky tape at the tip of the head.
- To hold the head in the folded position (trapping the pom-poms and tongue) you will need
  to staple though both pieces of foam.
- Turn the head over so the staple ends are facing upwards and cut a small piece of foam
  using the fancy edge scissors and stick down with the double-sided tape so as to cover
  the staple ends. You may wish to put another strip of foam on the other side of the head
  to keep it as symmetrical as possible.
- Glue the goggle eyes on either side of the head (to the pom-poms).
- · Take the other end of the chenille stems and fold them over about 1.2 cms in.
- Starting about halfway down the pencil coil the chenille stems tightly around the pencil.
   This should represent the snake's body.
- · Finally bend the head over into place.



This activity requires the use of scissors and glue. Leaders should exercise appropriate caution

# **Animal Safari**



### Instructions:

- · This game is very simple but great fun.
- · Ask the boys to form into a circle.
- Give them each an animal name, action and noise. E.g. elephant, use arm to waggle trunk and make trumpeting noise.
- One animal starts by making their actions/noises and passes on to another by making their actions and noises.
- This boy then responds by making his actions/noises and passing on to another boy.
- Start each boy with a set amount of points (around 10). Boys lose points when they fail
  to do their actions/noises or by passing it straight back to the person who passed it to
  them.

# **Equipment:**

- TV/Video cartoon of Jungle Book or similar showing animals
- · List of questions from the 10 minute clip

- This activity will require some forward planning. Before the session you will need to prepare a 10 minute clip from the Jungle Book or another film or cartoon showing animals.
- Ensure you know what happens in the clip and set questions on what happens in the clip.
- Ideal questions will test the boys' observation e.g. what colour were a certain animal's eyes?
- Before showing the clip to the boys tell them they need to be watching closely for all the
  things that happen and how things look. You can give them clues if you think they need
  to watch out for certain things.
- Once the clip has finished you can either give the boys pen and paper and get them all
  to write down responses to your question (which you will need to read out) or you can ask
  the questions and ask the boys to put their hands up.

# **Find the Rainbow**

**Aim:** For the boys to go exploring in the church and help them become more aware of their surroundings

# **Equipment:**

- Pens
- Paper

- The boys, in groups or on their own, produce a table with two columns and eight rows.
- At the top of the left hand column write 'colour' and the top of the right hand column write 'object'.
- Now, down the colours column ask the boys to fill in all the different colours of the rainbow, red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, violet.
- The boys then go off around the Church or in a designated area and try to find one object for each of the colours that they have listed.
- The team or individual who returns with the table completed first is the winner and should receive a prize.

# **Marzipan Traffic** Lights



Aim: To make something that the boys can take home and eat

6-8 depending upon supervision



20 minutes

# **Equipment:**

- Block of marzipan
- Food colouring red, yellow, green
- Cooking chocolate
- Paper plates
- Clingfilm

### Instructions:

- Divide the marzipan into 3 equal parts.
- Knead it until soft.
- Put a few drops of food colouring into each piece (different colour in each piece) and continue to knead until it is all mixed in.
- Roll the marzipan out into long pieces, approximately 1/2 inch thick.
- Place 2 colours alongside each other and the other on the top in the middle to form a triangle shape.
- Melt the chocolate (either in a bowl in the microwave or in a bowl over a saucepan of hot
- Spread the chocolate over the marzipan and ensure it is completely covered.
- When the sides are dry, run a knife underneath.
- Turn over and do the same on the other side.
- When dry cut into 1-inch pieces. You should end up with a triangle of three colours coated in chocolate.
- Unless the boys have already eaten them, several pieces could be put onto a small paper plate, wrapped in clingfilm and taken home.



When working in the kitchen It is important that all boys are supervised and that they don't use any dangerous equipment without appropriate supervision. Leaders should be aware of any boys with nut allergies



# **Colour Alphabet**





**Aim:** To help the boys to think about all of the different names that colours have that are less common from the ones they are used to

# **Equipment:**

- Pens
- Writing paper

- · Boys should be split into groups of around three or four.
- Each group is given a sheet of paper and a pen. Down the left hand side of the piece of paper the boys should write the alphabet or selected letters depending on time available.
- In their groups they must quietly come up with a colour for each letter in the alphabet.
- The scoring works as follows: for each colour a group fills in they receive one point if another group has the same colour, and two points if it is a colour that no one else has.
- · The scores should be added up at the end and the winning group given a prize.
- It is important to let the boys use their imagination so offer them a little freedom when marking. Sometimes a word in front of a colour can be let to pass with a point, e.g.
  - L lime green; P pale pink; D dark brown.

# **Coloured Relay**



# **Equipment:**

- Balls
- Cones
- Hoops
- Skittles
- Beanbags etc

### **Instructions:**

- The boys are split up into teams of four or five depending on numbers. Each team is given
  a colour.
- Set up an obstacle course of which all the items should correspond with the colour of their team.
- The obstacle course will depend on the resources that are available to your company.
- Below are some suggestions:
  - Jumping through hoop
  - Throwing a bean bag at or into a target
  - Skipping up and down the hall twice using a skipping rope
  - Dribbling a football through a course of cones

# **Smarties Pick up**

2 or more teams of 3-8 boys



Aim: A bit of fun with a treat at the end

# **Equipment:**

- Smarties
- Bowls
- Straws
- Paper plates

- Boys get in to colour teams (each team has a colour).
- Each team is given a tube of smarties, a straw per boy and a plate for every different colour of smartie and one extra for all the smarties to start on.
- The object of the game is for the team to move as many smarties as possible by sucking them with a straw from the start plate to 'colours' plate i.e. all the red ones on one plate, all the blue ones on another, etc. plate.
- Depending on the size of teams each boy should have 20 seconds to try and move as many smarties as possible into the correct plate.
- The team who has moved the most smarties and placed them on the correct plate wins.
- A variation on this works where there are only two plates, one with smarties, the other
  without; the boys are blindfolded and they again only use a straw to move the smarties
  across from one plate to another. (This can get messy but is a lot of fun with the older
  boys.)

# Make a Spider



No maximum number depending on adequate supervision

# **Equipment:**

- Scissors
- · Lengths of nylon wool
- Pipe cleaners
- · Paper for 'eyes'
- · Elastic (thin)

- Cut a card ring out for all boys, which needs to be about 3" in diameter with a central hole of around 2".
- Fold the circle in half and position a length of nylon wool between the halves with the ends coming out of the folds.
- Ask the boys to wind wool around the half circle until the hollow is full.
- Place 4 pipe cleaners beneath the wool and tie the nylon wool tightly around the 'body'
  wool and the pipe cleaners.
- Pulling the cardboard out will leave a woolly ball. Fold the pipe cleaners to form legs and stick on some paper dots as eyes.
- All that remains is to tie some elastic to the spider's back to allow it to 'bounce'.

# **Beetle Draw**



Aim: The aim of the game is to complete the beetle first

# **Equipment:**

- · Template
- · Dice (one per team)

### **Instructions:**

- Divide the boys into teams of up to 4 per team.
- · Give each team a dice and a set of templates.
- Each body part should have a number as follows:
  - 6 body
  - 5 head
  - 4 eyes
  - 3 antenna
  - 2 legs
  - 1 tail
- The boys then take it in turns to roll the dice, with each number on the dice corresponding to a body part.
- Start with the body because everything attaches to the body. The eyes and antenna cannot be put on the beetle until the head has been attached to the body.
- When all the parts are in place the team has to shout 'beetle'.

# **Story Relay**

- Divide the boys into a number of teams depending on the size of group.
- · Name members of the team; spider, worm, cricket, centipede, butterfly.
- · Seat boys in a row, one behind the other.
- Tell a story and when each creepy crawly is mentioned the corresponding boys must run
  to one of the walls and back to their places.
- Point to the boy who gets back first.

# **Biscuit Decorating**



# **Equipment:**

- · Packet of digestive biscuits or rich team biscuits
- · Icing pens
- · Picture of a spider

### **Instructions:**

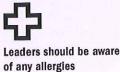
- Sit boys in small groups around tables and give each table one of the icing pens.
- Give one digestive biscuit to each boy.
- · The boys use the icing pens to draw/ice a picture of a spider onto the biscuit.
- · At the end of the evening the boys can eat their biscuit!

Read the story of David and Goliath 1 Samuel chapter 17

Talk to the boys about how David was given no hope to succeed, as he was too small and weak, but with God's help he was able to overcome Goliath. Explain that this is God's way of telling us that he will help us to overcome the hard things in life. What is important is that we can ask him for help.

# **Target Throwing Games**



# **Equipment:**

- · Bean bags
- Hoops
- Cans
- · Tennis balls
- Skittles
- Footballs

# Instructions:

Split the boys into three groups; each team will play each game twice. The games last for a maximum of ten minutes each. The time at each activity is flexible though if you have smaller groups then they will not need so long as the game may start to drag.

### **Beanbag Throw**

- · Boys should line up one behind the other; each boy will receive a beanbag.
- Using either chalk on the floor or hoops of different sizes mark out targets for the boys to throw into.
- The biggest hoop will be nearest, around 3 metres away, and then past that a slightly smaller one and then another one further on and smaller still.
- · The first hoop will be worth one point, the second two points and the third three.
- · A member of staff should note down every time points are scored.
- At the start signal the boys will take it in turn to throw their beanbag into a hoop. Once a
  boy has thrown, the bean bag must be recovered by the boy and he will rejoin the back
  of the queue and wait for his next turn.

### **Bowling**

- Stand 10 skittles up at one end of the hall, have the boys bowl footballs or smaller if you think that is appropriate.
- Boys will stand around 10 metres away or however far depending on the ability of the boys
- Each boy will take it in turn to bowl at the skittles. If he knocks any down then he scores
  that number.
- The boy must then run down to the other end of the hall and put back up the skittles he
  has knocked down, retrieve the ball and return to the end of his team's queue.

# Hit the Can

- On a table, three metres or so away from where the boys will stand, place five drinks cans.
- · Each of these cans will be worth two points.
- The boys can use tennis balls or beanbags to throw at the cans and try to knock them down; boys will take turns going one at a time.
- If they do knock a can down then they must replace it and return to the back of the queue.

As well as these three games there are many other games involving a target, which you can include. Remember, the target theme relates to David and his sling shot.

# **Stone Writing**





**Aim:** To make a decorated stone that can remind the boys of the David and Goliath story

# **Equipment:**

- Stones
- · Fabric-writing pen "fun liner magic pens"
- Oven

# **Preparation:**

- Ask each boy to bring in one largish stone with at least one smooth side. It is always a
  good idea to have some in reserve.
- Purchase from your local craft store some 'Fun liner magic pens' or any brand of stone or fabric writing pen.
- · Create a working area with newspaper on the table to stop tables getting messy.

### **Instructions:**

- · Each boy should be given a stone and choose a colour decorating pen.
- With the pen the boys decorate the stone in whatever way they wish, possibly with their name or favourite football team.
- Once a few of these are completed place them in the oven on 150C for no more the 60 seconds. You will be able to see the lettering puff up and expand. Once this has happened, leave the stones to cool.



Always be careful when using the oven that boys are not left alone to work it

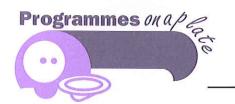

# Miniature Scattegories



# **Equipment:**

- · Pens/pencils
- Paper

This game is just a trimmed down version of the real game.

### **Instructions:**

- Provide one piece of paper per boy. On each piece draw columns with letters as headings (the same on each page). You will probably need 3-5 letters.
- · As the boys arrive give them a pen/pencil and piece of paper each.
- Each boy should try to think of as many foods as possible beginning with the letter at the head of each column and write them down in the column.
- · The winning boy is the one who thinks of the most different foods.

# Chocolate Crispy Cakes





# **Ingredients:**

- · 100g bar of dark chocolate
- 50g (2oz) raisins
- 50g (2oz) butter
- 60g (21/20z) cornflakes
- · 2 tablespoons of golden syrup
- · 1 small tub of glace cherries (optional)
- · Paper muffin cases
- · Heatproof bowl
- Mixing bowl
- · Wooden spoons

### **Method:**

- Break the chocolate into small pieces and put into a heatproof bowl with the golden syrup and butter.
- Fill a saucepan with water and bring to the boil and turn down to simmering. (This should be done by a leader.)
- Hold the bowl over the saucepan to melt the chocolate making sure the bowl doesn't touch the water. (This should be done by a leader.)
- Allow the boys to stir the contents of the bowl taking caution as the bowl will be hot.
- In a large mixing bowl mix together the raisins and cornflakes.
- Pour the chocolate sauce over the comflakes and raisins, stir and fold until everything is nicely mixed together.
- · Put about two dessert spoons of the mixture into each muffin case.
- Optionally, put half a cherry on each cake and refrigerate. Ideally, the cakes need an hour and a half in the fridge to set. However, a fridge set on cold should set them quicker.

This recipe should make about 18 cakes; if you have a large Junior Section you may need to split the group up accordingly.



Ask the boys to wash their hands before and after the activity. Only an adult should use the cooker/oven. Make sure work surfaces are cleaned before and after use. Leaders should be aware of any food allergies their boys might have

# **Chocolate Game**

Programmes on a page

This game will work best with a reasonable size chocolate bar (approx. 250g).

# **Equipment:**

- · Hat, scarf, gloves
- · Knife, fork
- · Chocolate bar
- Dice
- Tray

### Instructions:

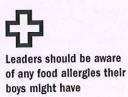
- Ask the boys to sit in a circle and place all the equipment on the tray (except the dice) in the middle of the circle.
- Boys take it in turn to roll the dice with the aim to throw a six.
- When a boy rolls a six he goes to the middle of the circle and puts on the hat, gloves and scarf and has to cut up the chocolate using the knife and fork.
- · The boys must eat a square at a time, as it is cut.
- The boy stays in the middle until another boy rolls a 6.
- · The game concludes when all the chocolate has been eaten.

- Paper plates
- · Dried food ie. rice, pasta shapes, lentils
- Glue
- Paints

### **Instructions:**

- The aim of this activity is for each boy to make a face on a paper plate using dry foods.
- Examples of foods to use are pasta, rice, lentils etc.
- · Boys may wish to use paints to add extra edge to the face.
- Use suitable glue to stick the food to the plate.
- · The food can be painted and features added in paint to the plate.



This activity requires the use of glue. Leaders should exercise appropriate caution

# **Baked Bean Relay**



# **Equipment:**

- Table
- · Baked beans
- Bowls
- · One cocktail stick per boy

### Instructions:

- Put the boys into teams of about five to avoid boys standing around for too long.
- Position a table on the opposite side of the hall and empty the baked beans into bowls (one bowl per team). The number of beans you put in each bowl will depend on how long you want the game to go on for, but you will need to ensure they have the same amount in each so this will need to be prepared beforehand.
- Boys line up in teams and on command take it in turns to run up to the table and pick
  up a baked bean using a cocktail stick, eat it and run back to their team.
- The next boy runs and the game continues until all the beans have been eaten.

# Lord's Prayer Collage Evening

**Aim:** To help familiarise the boys with the Lord's Prayer and also to help them understand what each section of the prayer means

This activity is different to the other 'Programmes a on plate' ideas as it is one long activity, which should take up all evening, or the activity could be split over 2 weeks.

# **Equipment:**

- · Old magazines
- · Fabric of different colours
- · Paper/card
- · Felt tip pens
- · Colouring pencils
- Glue
- Scissors
- Photos
- Sweet wrappers
- · Other food packets

### **Preparation:**

- · Split the boys into eight groups.
- For each group obtain a large piece of card or paper. It is recommended that this should be the size of flip chart paper and possibly larger.
- Set up eight different workstations on which there should be pens, pencils, scissors and glue.

### Instructions:

- · Boys in their groups should each be given one of the large sheets of paper.
- Before they start creating the collage they should divide the paper up as shown below.



- Missing out the top left box write in as a title at the top of each starting from the top row one in from the left
  - Our Father in Heaven
  - Your name is Holy
  - Your kingdom come
  - Your will be done on Earth as it is in Heaven
  - Give us today the food we need
  - Forgive us the wrongs we have done
  - Do not lead us into temptation
  - For yours is the Kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever, Amen



This activity requires the use of scissors and glue. Leaders should exercise appropriate caution



- On each table the boys fill in one section of their collage. In each box they will add pictures that they think relate to this section of the prayer and what Jesus is trying to tell us.
- The first box left without a heading should be filled with the words 'The Lord's Prayer'. The
  boys can do this however they like and decorate it as they wish.

Below are some suggestions of ways the areas can be filled. It is important that at every different work area a member of staff explains the meaning of the line to the boys.

- Our Father in Heaven. Explain to the boys that it is an amazing thing that we are able
  to call God 'Father' and that we are able to speak to him in such a way. One idea for this
  section is to ask the boys to cut out people shapes and attach to them speech bubbles
  filled with things that we can talk to God about.
- Your Name is Holy. Talk with the boys about how special God's name is. One way to
  convey this is to ask the boys to think of different words to describe how great God is and
  ask them to cut out the words in fabric, letter by letter. You could provide pictures of things
  the boys understand as Holy: Church, cross, etc.
- Your Kingdom come. Explain to the boys that this part of the prayer is talking about how
  Christians want God's family to grow. A suggestion for this could relate to families by
  cutting out pictures of groups of people from magazines. It is important to explain to
  younger boys what is meant by the use of the word 'family'.
- Your will be done on Earth as it is in Heaven. Tell the boys about how God wants us
  to live our lives in ways that he guides us. Possibly, this time, ask the boys to decorate
  the section with words that they think describe the ways in which God wants us to live.
- Give us today the food that we need. This is simple and the boys should need little
  explanation for this line. A possible collage suggestion is to draw some foods or to stick
  food packets or sweet wrappers onto the paper.
- Forgive us the wrongs that we do. Explain to the boys how God understands that it is
  not possible to be perfect all of the time. All he asks is that we are sorry and try our
  hardest not to do the wrong thing again.
- Do not lead us into temptation. Talk to the boys about how sometimes doing the wrong
  thing seems like a good idea and this is called temptation. In this part of the prayer we
  are asking for help from God to stop us falling for this temptation.
- For yours is the Kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever, Amen. In this
  part of the prayer explain to the boys that we are telling God how powerful he is and that
  he owns the whole world. For this section the boys could fill it with photos of famous
  places and grand landscapes e.g. Niagara Falls or Mount Everest.

### **Devotions**

Reading: Matthew 6 verse 5 - 14 which includes The Lord's Prayer

Talk with the boys about the reading. Explain to them further about prayer and the way Jesus said how, when, where and why we should pray.



# **Senses Evening**

**Estimated Time:** 

5 minutes

This programme on a plate is designed to last a whole evening. You do not, however, have to use all of the activities suggested and they can be tailored to suit.

**Arrival Activity** 

Senses Word Scramble - copy template onto card

10 minutes Numbered Football With A Twist

**Talk:** Mark 10 v46-52 Story Of Blind Bartimaeus Read from Bible or tell the story in your own words.

Go on to discuss how the boys have used all of their senses in different ways that night. Mention how the game earlier became much harder when they could not use their ears to pick up the sound and how crab football is different from normal football. What would happen if they couldn't walk?

Song: He gave me eyes so I could see. (Junior Praise, 74 or Come and Praise, 18)

**Prayer:** Thank God for senses and all of our abilities. Pray that he helps us not to hold prejudice against those who are less fortunate and learn to tolerate all people.

# Numbered Football with a Twist



This is a popular game with a small twist at the end to encourage the boys to think about how useful their senses are.

10 minutes per station

- Divide the boys into two teams and line them up along the wall in opposite corners of the
  wall.
- Set two small goals up on each far wall and place a football in the centre of the hall.
- · Number the boys in each team from 1 upwards.
- Randomly call out a number and when a boy's number is called he must run out from his
  team corner and attempt to score a goal in the opposition's goal. If you have a large
  Junior Section and a large enough space you may wish to call several numbers out at a
  time.
- · Once a goal is scored the players return to their corner and a new round begins.
- When the game is drawing to a close, explain to the boys that you are going to slightly change the rules. Now you are only going to mouth the number and they must lip-read to get the number.
- Do not worry if the boys find this difficult to do, as this is the point. Only a few rounds like
  this, as some of the boys may get despondent quickly.



# **Senses Activities**



No maximum number depending on adequate supervision



5-10 minutes per activity

The following activities are designed to test all of the boys' senses and need to last for about 40 minutes. Dependent on staffing and number of boys you may decide to split the boys into small groups to go around each station in turn. Splitting the boys into groups may help in some activities where you may only be able to find a limited number of items that they need to identify so that you can reuse some with another group.

### **Equipment:**

- Templates
- · Crayons/pencils
- Blindfolds

# Sight

For this activity you will need to set up an obstacle course and to blindfold each of the boys in turn and get them to traverse the obstacle course. Obstacles can be chairs or benches they have to go over, tables they must crawl under and hoops they must go through. Each boy is allowed a guide so it would be best to pair the boys off to begin with and one boy is blindfolded while the other boy guides him. If time is short you could let multiple pairs of boys go through the course at the same time.

### Touch

This involves the boys touching regular household items that they cannot see and asking them to identify them. It is best to hide them behind a curtain or in a box that they have to put their hands into as this avoids blindfolding them again. It may be quite hard to find enough items for all boys to have a go. If you put items into a box you could send the boy out of the room and show the item to rest of the boys and then put it in the box and allow the boy who is identifying the item back in. Example items could be rolling pins, coat hangers, hairbrushes etc.

# Hearing

There is a lot of choice in what you can do to let the boys use their hearing to help them. For example you can play television tunes, or popular chart songs or even random sounds from the home e.g. boiling kettle. Obviously, these sounds will need to be prepared onto a tape in advance, and the boys can be arranged in teams to try and identify these sounds. Sit the boys around tables in groups and give them pen and paper and ask them to write down what they think the sound is.

### **Taste**

Use a good old-fashioned taste test. Good ways of doing this would be to fill bowls with several flavours of crisps and ask the boys to identify the flavour of crisps in each bowl. Alternatively, or as well, you could use a blacked out bottle (some brands of soft drink use black bottles) and fill with a diluted flavoured juice drink for the boys to identify. You could use several bottles if time allows. An alternative is to blindfold the boys and feed them some food, for example, fruit pieces.

### **Smell**

In a similar way to the taste test above, find things from home with distinctive smells for the boys to identify. Examples of these include coffee, ketchup, vinegar, different flavourings, for example vanilla, spices.

# **Crab Football**

Programmes on a page

This is always an interesting game to play and requires little effort to set up.

# **Instructions:**

- Divide the boys into teams (you may need more than two teams if you have a large junior section and play more than one game).
- The game is the same as normal football except the boys must move around and kick in the crab position. i.e. the boys assume a position with their feet flat on the floor and are arched over backwards with their hands touching the floor underneath them.
- Movement is a little harder and you should ensure no one's hands are trodden on!

# Visit by Visually Impaired Person and Guide Dog

This will be a good activity if it can be arranged as it will, hopefully, make the children curious. You may be able to arrange this through The Association for The Blind. The visitor could share their lifestyle with the boys, invite the boys to ask questions and to take an interest in the guide dog.

# **Sports Evening**



**Aim:** To let the boys enjoy an active evening, as a change from normal evenings

**Estimated Time:** 

**Arrival Activity** 

Ask the boys if they know of a famous sports person. Come prepared with some information and facts about a well known footballer or other sports person. Ask boys about teams they support.

Talk about how hard athletes have to train and work to achieve success. Ask the boys to discuss how this is not only relevant to sport but in life in general at school, at home etc. Explain to the boys how God wants them to work as hard as they can in every area of life be it sport or not. Explain to the boys that sometimes no matter how hard they try they will not win but to God it is not who wins or loses (although that is important) but how hard you try.

End with a prayer:

Lord Jesus, we pray for all who are involved in professional and amateur sport. May they set the highest of standards, on and off the field. Help us, like them to give our best all of the time, and to enjoy what we do. AMEN

### **Football Skills**

Aim: Try to improve the boys' football skills

#### **Equipment:**

- Football per boy
- Cones

#### Instructions:

- This session could be completed outside if there is not enough space indoors.
- Ask the boys to do a dribbling exercise, possibly in a relay team where they will dribble in and out of some cones and then back tagging the next member of the team.
- Ask them to do a Heading drill, where they throw a football up against a wall and then
  head it back to the wall. They should try to keep this going.
- Next play a game similar to football but with a twist. The game works as normal except boys cannot move with the ball. The game works in the same way as netball. The boys will be forced to work on their passing and movement without the ball.

#### **Additional Activity:**

Play a game of football at your premises or you could arrange to play another Company on a Saturday at your local playing fields or recreational ground.

# Other Sports to be Played



**Aim:** To continue the theme of sports with another active game

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No maximum number depending on adequate supervision



10-15 minutes per game

#### **Equipment:**

- Hockey/unihoc sticks and puck (for indoor hockey)
- · Bat, ball and stumps/chair (for non-stop cricket)

### **Indoor Hockey**

#### **Instructions:**

- Split the boys into two teams or create a tournament with more teams in it depending on the number of boys present.
- The game requires plastic hockey sticks and a rubber puck but a tennis ball also works
  well.
- · Each team has a goal to defend and they must do this using only the hockey sticks.
- Sticks should be held with two hands and never swung above waist height. It is important
  that free hits are given to the opposing team to help stop violation of the rules.
- When playing the game in tournament form, play the first to two goals or a time limit. This
  will depend on how easy the boys find it to score as if it is too easy games will be over
  very quickly.

### Non stop cricket

#### Instructions:

- The game is best played outside but works inside providing that there is a large enough area in which to play and there are no breakables in that area.
- Boys are split into two teams, one batting and the other fielding.
- The game works best if there is the same leader or a boy bowling who can be impartial towards both teams.
- · The game works on a time limit, say seven minutes batting per team.
- The bowler bowls the ball from about three metres in front of the batsman, who will then
  try and hit the ball. Regardless of whether the boy hits the ball he must run to a cone
  situated 5 metres or so to one side of the stumps and back.
- While this is happening the fielding team have to return the ball to the bowler who can bowl it as soon as he gets it.
- · Players can be out by getting bowled or caught.
- Every time a team member is out the team loses 3 points. The 'out' batsman rejoins the
  queue at the back and may bat again if it gets around to him for a second time.



## Winter Evening

**Estimated Time:** 

This programme on a plate is designed to last a whole evening. You do not, however, have to use all of the activities suggested and they can be tallored to suit.

**Arrival Activities** 

20 minutes Snowy Wordsearch

Winter Crossword - copy both templates onto card

10 minutes Snowman Relay

10 minutes Snowballs

30 minutes Snow Scene

10 minutes **Devotions** 

Talk to the boys about how winter is a fun time for them with Christmas and the snow in particular, but for a lot of homeless and older people winter can be a very hard time. Also talk about ways in which we can help these people to get through a time that others find so much fun.

# **Snowman Relay**



Aim: To get the boys active and moving around at the start of the session

#### **Equipment:**

- · Hat, scarf, gloves
- Carrot
- · Chair per team

#### Instructions:

- Split boys into teams of around three or four depending on the numbers that are present.
- The boys are to sit at one end of the hall or playing area in a row one behind the other.
- Opposite them at the other end of the playing area is a chair on which there is a hat, some gloves, a scarf and a carrot.
- On the starting signal, the first boy in each team runs to his chair, puts on all of the clothes, then holds the carrot to his nose and runs around the chair three times.
- When he has done this he takes off all of the clothes, puts them back on the chair and runs back to his team.
- The next boy will then repeat the process, and so on until all of the boys in the team have completed the dressing up. The first team to all be sitting down are the winners.

5 or 10 minutes depending on how good the boys are at the game Aim: Short active game for boys

#### **Equipment:**

· Sponge balls

#### **Instructions:**

- Split the boys into two teams.
- Both teams will stand on opposite sides of the hall.
- Each team is given two or three sponge balls, more if that is relevant to the number of boys playing.
- On the starting signal the teams throw the balls at the opposite team. If a boy is hit below the hip then he must join the opposition team.
- · This process continues until all of the boys are on one team.



It is important that the balls used are soft and that there is no chance of injury being caused

### **Snow Scene**



**Aim:** To make something that the boys can take home to show for their winter evening

#### **Equipment:**

- · See through jar with an airtight lid
- Small plastic Christmas figure, e.g. snowman or robin
- · Water resistant glue
- Glycerine
- Water
- Glitter
- · Paper and pens to decorate outside

#### Instructions:

- Each boy selects one of the small plastic models, which will become the centrepiece of their snow scene.
- The boys glue the figure onto the underside of the lid using water resistant glue.
- · Leave the figure to dry on to the lid.
- Fill the jar or tub with a mixture of water and glycerine. You will need to experiment with
  the ratio of the mixture as the smaller the ratio the thicker it will be, it's a matter of
  preference.
- · Add to this the glitter.
- Ensure that the jar is not totally full as there needs to be room for the displacement caused by the figure.
- Once the figure has dried onto the lid, it is time to fix it to the jar. For extra waterproofing
  put some of the water resistant glue around the inside edge of the lid, which will not only
  further secure the lid but help keep the mantlepiece dry.
- The boys may also wish to decorate the outside of the jar. One suggestion for this is to attach a strip of paper to the bottom of the jar to cover up the area where the lid joins and also to make the base of the lid less visible.
